

Keeping busy in Bangkok

PAIMA member Boonma in Thailand has been busy since the last issue of *PAIMA Report*. During that time the company has set up Christmas trees in 5-star hotels; organized fire training for all its staff; helped protect the environment; and won a fine art shipping award.

For the fifth year running Boonma won the contract to install Christmas trees in some of Bangkok's most luxurious hotels. This includes the placing and decorating of a six-meter tree in the city's Waldorf Astoria.

The company has organized Annual Fire Drill and Fire Evacuation Training for all employees. This involved learning about fire-fighting methods, handling equipment and practicing fire evacuation plans. The training was performed with the help of the Safety Department to make sure the staff are fully prepared should an actual fire occur.

As part of its efforts to protect the environment, Boonma has joined the Net Zero Pledge for the Events Industry, the first mover in Thailand to do so, and has been invited to be a part of the Advisory Group. To achieve this goal, Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions must be reduced and the non-avoidable ones must be compensated or 'neutralized' through the use of long-term carbon capture solutions. It is different from 'carbon neutral'. For carbon neutrality, the non-avoided emissions are compensated through traditional offsets (carbon credits

coming from projects that develop renewable energies, efficient transport, etc.). Carbon neutrality can be an intermediate step towards net zero.

"The Net Zero Carbon Events initiative aims to bring together a wide range of industry stakeholders to construct an industry-wide roadmap towards net zero by 2050, and emission reductions by 2030 in line with the Paris Agreement, with support and guidance on key issues," explained Tiddy S Teerawit, Executive Director of Boonma Group. This initiative is hosted by JMIC (Joint Meetings Industry Council) and is supported by the UNFCCC

"We have a new, elegant office space and enough storage space to handle all your customers," he said. "Facial recognition technology protects the access gates, we have 24-hour surveillance and security guards on motorcycles. It's unbeatable!" The new facility was officially opened on 8 March, 2022 to coincide with International Women's Day that celebrates women's achievements and reinforces a commitment to equality.

Positive pandemic effect

In addition to his new premises, Lars explained that the COVID pandemic has had a very positive effect on customs procedures at the ports and

airports of Brazil. "Customs procedures have been modernized and now all processes are paperless," he said. "It's possible to upload documents directly to the sites and even fine arts are released in less than an hour. It took up to 15 to 20 days in the past."

Teamwork has adopted strict COVID-19 protection protocols throughout the business. "Our people all wear masks, use alcohol-gel sanitizers and maintain social distancing during packing jobs," said Lars. "Our customers understand and accept our measures fully." Lars said that around 95% of Teamwork's staff, both office and operational, have been vaccinated with at least two shots. "They all carry vaccine passports."

Conroy Removals celebrates 50th anniversary

David Conroy, CEO of Conroy Removals

hen 20-year-old New Zealander
David Conroy bought his first
truck back in 1972 he could have had no
idea that 50 years later his fledgling
business would have become one of
Australasia's leading international moving
companies. Particularly as David entered
the industry almost by accident, being
more interested in trucks and driving than
moving furniture.

David explained, "I'd worked as a driver since leaving school and I was keen to start my own transport business. The trouble was, in those days it was very difficult to get a license to operate trucks because the government wanted to protect its investment in the railways. The easiest way was to buy a company that already had a license, so that's what I did, and it just happened to be a removals company! At the time I only had \$3,000 and the man selling the business wanted \$4,000, so I persuaded my mother to lend me the rest to get me started. She later

went on to work with me, answering the phone and handling the accounts."

Even with a license, operating a transport company in New Zealand in the early seventies was not without its challenges. "General freight operators were restricted to journeys of no more than 40 miles from their base, but as furniture movers we had a license to travel anywhere in the North Island," said David. "If we wanted to go to South Island we had to get a special permit to cross on the ferries. That's now all been disbanded and you can go where you like, how you like."

After 18 months, David's elder brother Gary joined the company and played a key role in the business's development until his retirement three years ago. He remains a director and a major shareholder in the company. Gary's son Chris joined Conroy in 1988 and currently works as a driver in Hawkes Bay.

David's daughter Fiona joined Conroy's Wellington branch shortly after leaving university, working in the sales department where she learnt the skills of cubing and estimating. Now after what she calls a twenty-year apprenticeship, she works alongside David handling the day to day running of the company from the company's HQ in Napier, with David focusing on finance for the wider group.

Conroy is still very much a family business, although none of Fiona's three siblings work for the company. "We have a strict family rule. When you hit eighteen you study or work and do your own thing for a few years and if you're still interested in joining the company, look at doing it then," said Fiona. "I think that's a good philosophy. I went to live in the UK for a while, which I loved, and then did my Batchelor of Commerce degree back here in NZ. I think that experience of life and education was very valuable," said Fiona.

From its humble beginnings, Conroy now employs over 300 full-time staff with a further 70 part-time personnel at its branches in New Zealand and 'across the ditch' in Australia.

"In 1986 we moved into Auckland with a sort of man and van operation and now it is the biggest branch of the seven we have across the country," said David. "For the first 25 years we only serviced New Zealand and it was my brother Gary who got us into international moving and he worked very hard to build up that side of the business."

It was during a holiday to Australia in 1999 that David first had the idea of opening a branch there. "We'd already taken over three small businesses in NZ and I thought; we talk the same, we act the same, why not open a branch in Australia as well?" said David. "We bought a small run-down business in Brisbane and built it up from there."

As well as the Brisbane office, Conroy now has branches in Sydney, Melbourne, Perth and Townsville.

Today, the company's revenue is almost equally split between commercial, domestic and international moving, with a further 10% generated from storage.

So, what is the key to Conroy's success over the last 50 years? "I think we've tried very hard to keep things straightforward and to seize opportunities when they arise," said Fiona. David added, "We've also been fortunate in having some pretty good people stick with us over the years and that's helped a lot. Several have been with us, or in the industry, for over 30 years and really know the business. We've had the drive and the ambition of course to drive things forward and we've continually kept investing in the business and the latest technology. I think that's very important if you want to be

Conroy joined PAIMA 12 years ago having been encouraged to join by fellow member Gary Burke of Burke Bros in the UK. "Gary was instrumental in bringing us to PAIMA and I'd like to give a nod to him for all his help," said David. olverhampton-based Burke Bros Moving Group in the UK is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year, a milestone that also marks 21 years of PAIMA membership.

It was back in 1982 with less than £1,000 in the bank, a second-hand Luton truck and encouragement from their father, that brothers Gary and Chris Burke began their fledgling transport business.

"Our original idea was to do light haulage and small parcel deliveries," explained Gary. "We advertised in the local papers and put cards in shop windows, but all we got were enquiries from people wanting to move fridges, sofas, or pianos. We realized there was a big demand for removals and the business just evolved from there."

It soon became clear to the brothers that to be successful they would need to have storage facilities and when a three-year lease became available on a local industrial estate, they decided to take a chance. "Our Mother went bonkers," remembered Chris. "You can't sign a lease, you'll be tied in for the three years, what if it doesn't work out?" she said. "But we explained that lots of

customers had asked if we did storage and we were going to go ahead. Within three weeks it was full and we kicked ourselves for not renting a bigger unit."

Gary and Chris soon realized they would need to rent a larger warehouse and move into containerized storage. That would mean buying side-opening trucks, a forklift and hiring extra staff to run it; but that would take money they didn't have. "We went to our bank, but they weren't interested, they said it was too risky, in fact no one we approached would back us," said Gary. "We eventually managed to contracthire container trucks and a forklift truck and I persuaded our suppliers to give us extended credit until we got things rolling. Our suppliers were particularly kind and I'm eternally grateful to them for their help. We remember things like that, and 40 years later we're still dealing with the people who believed in us during those early days," said

The brothers went on to purchase three leading Midlands removal companies: Hudson & Rudge Removals Birmingham Ltd, George Clark Removals Ltd (Wolverhampton) and Goddards Removals Rugby Ltd.



After several years they incorporated the companies into the formation of the Group.

Today, Burke Bros Moving Group is one of the most successful moving companies in the West Midlands with 45 staff, a fleet of trucks, extensive warehousing and partners across the globe, many of them PAIMA members.

Burke Bros joined PAIMA in 2001, and soon became advocates of the network, building both business relationships and lifelong friendships along the way. Gary also became involved with the PAIMA Board, becoming vice president in 2010 and was involved in the decision-making process to transfer PAIMA Headquarters from Panama to Florida.

As a long-standing Wolverhampton company, Gary and Chris are dedicated to supporting the local area. For several years they have supported a number of charities, including Compton Care - a local hospice that helps patients and their families facing life-limiting illnesses - by donating furniture and books collected from customers, to sell in their network of charity

shops. Gary became trustee and non-executive director at the hospice in 2014.

Gary commented, "We've been supported by the local community for almost 40 years as our business has grown and we believe it is right to give something back by helping the community that has been so integral to our own success."

See you in 'The Big Peach'

eorgia's capital, Atlanta – The Big Peach – will host this year's PAIMA Convention from 30 October to 1 November. So why do they call it The Big Peach? There are many theories.


Fast-forward to the present day and Atlanta has risen from the ashes to become one of America's most prosperous cities, with a diverse range of industries including information technology, transportation. finance and biomedical research. Major corporations such as Coca-Cola, Delta Air Lines and AT&T have established their headquarters there and Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport has been the world's busiest passenger airport for over 20 years. In 1996 Atlanta hosted the summer Olympic Games, spurring the gentrification of many of its poorer districts and setting a trend for improvements that continued into the noughties and beyond.

Some of Atlanta's most famous sons and daughters include Martin-Luther King Jr, and singers, Gladys Knight and Brenda Lee; there are many, many others. But perhaps one of the most unlikely adopted residents is rock star Sir Elton John who moved to the city in 1991 and apparently loves it there. During an interview by a local newspaper in 1998 Elton said, "People always ask me, 'Why do you have a place in Atlanta?' It's because people here have always been nice to me ... I've always



New Zealand opening for business

onroy Removals explains how New Zealand is finally opening up again to its own nationals abroad and, from April, to overseas visitors.

In February the New Zealand government announced a new plan to open the borders to travelers across the world in a five-stage process for 2022.

This resulted in, most notably, the end of the requirement for fully vaccinated passengers to isolate in MIQ (Managed Isolation Quarantine) from late February. Instead, incoming fully vaccinated passengers are now required to self-isolate at home or at a suitable venue.

Expect a surge in demand

We see the announcement as welcome news for the many thousands of stranded Kiwis and expect return travel and household shipments to ramp up over the coming months.

It will take a while for airlines to rebuild their frequencies to New Zealand, and some may still be hesitant to commit due to the ever-changing nature of COVID and its variants.

The number of airlines flying into New Zealand reached its lowest level since the 1960s with only Air New Zealand, Emirates, Singapore Air and Qatar providing regular passenger flights. Other airlines operated one a week for mostly cargo.

A note of caution: COVID isn't over and there is always the chance the new government dials back the timeline – as they have done before. But for the time being this is the plan and we'd urge you to share the details with clients if they haven't already read up on them.

The 5 stages in detail

1. February 27 – Kiwis in Australia

From 11.59pm on February 27 New Zealanders in Australia have been able to arrive in New Zealand without going into MIQ. This includes both citizens and permanent residents of New Zealand. Partners and dependent children of citizens and permanent residents in Australia will also be included, although evidence is needed to prove this relationship. Also included are a host of critical workers currently eligible under various border exceptions, coming from Australia. This includes critical health workers, dairy workers, teachers, tech workers, and several other professions.

2. March 13 - Kiwis anywhere

From 11.59pm on March 13 the rules for Australia were widened to the rest of the world.

Kiwis from anywhere – whether citizens or permanent residents – can now skip MIQ and self-isolate at home instead. Their partners and dependent children can also come

The critical workers mentioned above - teachers, medical workers - may now come from anywhere.

Alongside them will be a much wider swathe of skilled workers who are not Kiwis.

However, they would need to be earning at least 1.5x the median wage – so \$84,240 a year. The government expects this change will benefit agriculture and ICT industries mostly.

Working holiday schemes can restart from this date.

The family reunification border exception for highly skilled workers is now aligned with the expanded settings for long-term critical workers, so more onshore workers are now able to reunite with their families.

3. April 12: Anyone with a visa, and sports and music stars

From 11.59pm on April 12 anyone with a visa could skip MIQ.

Also allowed in will be 5,000 overseas students eligible to study in semester two.

The government will also look to expand the number of skilled workers coming in – to include seasonal workers and some critical workers who wouldn't meet the income test mentioned above.

Professional sports players and cultural performers and their support staff could also come in. They would have to be performing in events with 'significant national/regional benefits'.

4. July or earlier: Visa-waiver countries The next stage will happen by July at the latest, according to the government - but Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said there was a high likelihood it could happen earlier.

It will see anyone from a visa-waiver country able to skip MIQ if vaccinated. A huge list of countries have visa waivers for visiting New Zealand for up to three months – including the USA, UK, Japan, and most of Europe.

Australians would also be able to travel here freely for as long as they like.

Normal work visas would also open back up for workers earning over the median wage.

5. October: Everyone else

From October normal visa processing would resume and travelers from anywhere would be able to come to New Zealand and skip MIQ. It's not quite clear if at this point they would need to self-isolate.

How will self-isolation work? Will they need tests?

Travelers will need to present a negative predeparture test to get into New Zealand.

They will be handed three free Rapid Antigen Tests at the airport – one to use on day zero or one, one to use on day five or six, and one spare. If any of those are positive they will have to retest with a more accurate PCR test.

Travelers will eventually be treated as if they are contacts of cases. That means for now, 10 days of self-isolation.

But once New Zealand reaches its new phase of dealing with Omicron – something that is supposed to happen once the outbreak gets a bit larger – then that will be reduced to seven days, as it will be for close contacts.

People will be able to travel by private transport to their self-isolation spot - so you could fly into Auckland but drive (or be driven) to Hamilton.

And people inside your household could still come and go, unless you test positive.

Travelers who break self-isolation will be liable for a hefty \$12,000 fine.

But self-isolation isn't expected to last forever – Ardern signaled that the government will be looking to phase it out eventually, which would make more regular tourism possible.

What about the unvaccinated?

All of the above applies to people who have been vaccinated against COVID-19. Kiwis who have not been vaccinated will still need to enter MIQ just as they do now. Unvaccinated children under five will be able to travel with their parents. A wider exceptions regime for children is being worked on.

Ardern said MIQ would be scaled back but not completely dismantled, and transitioned into a more long-term "National Quarantine Service". This could include purpose-built facilities.

Spotlight on Bliss Moving & Logistics



International Partner Relationship Manager, Alessandro Mannozzi, who joined Bliss in 2009 explained, "Giuliano had corporate clients all over the world and he was able to bring many of them over to Bliss when he joined the company and that was a big help. Although he is approaching the age when many people would think about retiring, Giuliano is still working very hard; he's the kind of person who can't just stay at home I quess."

Bliss Moving is sharply focused on international mobility, but there is still room for some domestic work within Italy. "The domestic moving market is very competitive here in Italy and there are lots of small companies with low overheads willing to do jobs for very low prices," said Alessandro. "We do carry out some moves, especially for our corporate clients and sometimes we are able to book moves with private customers even if we are more expensive; I believe they value our reputation, solidity and level of professionalism. But most of the time clients are just looking for the cheapest price and we prefer not to book business where the margin is very, very, low. We all need profit to continue to grow and invest."

With its headquarters in Rome and a second office in Milan the company is well placed to capture business from both government and commercial sectors. "Rome is at the heart of government business in Italy with lots of government departments and foreign embassies, whereas Milan is the main center for corporates; it's the Italian business gateway," said Alessandro. "Francesco invests a lot of time and effort in Milan approaching new corporate accounts to secure business for Bliss and to share with our partners worldwide, so it's important to have a consolidated and strong presence there. I believe the secret of this industry is to provide your partners with the highest levels of service and place reciprocal business with them, otherwise you risk being out of the game."

Most of the company's international traffic is to and from Italy and the USA, along with a healthy trade in Australia and the Middle East, where there are large Italian communities. The remainder of business comes from Europe, the UK and Africa, but the US remains the dominant source of business.

"Giuliano grew up in the United States, in fact his mother language is American English. His relationships with US partners go back to the 1980s when he ran his own business and that is one of the reasons most of our traffic comes from there," said Alessandro.

In 2015, Bliss began offering relocation services under the direction of Francesco's brother Giulio. "We realized there was a good market for relocation services and decided to start a new department to deal with it, not just for people moving to Italy, but also to other destinations around the world," said Alessandro. "It's still a minor division of the Group, but it is growing steadily and is definitely worthwhile. It's a very important part of our cross-selling strategy to corporate accounts."

Another important part of Bliss' business is moving pets, through the Group company Bliss Pet Services. "We began our pet moving service about ten years ago and it has been very successful," said Alessandro. "Moving pets is very different from moving household goods and you have to realize how special animals are to their owners. First you have to love pets and treat them as you would your own. It can be quite a challenge. Moving a large dog from Italy to Australia, for example, is not easy and you have to deal with all the veterinary and immigration regulations as well. That's why most moving companies don't offer pet moving and why it can be so expensive."

Bliss joined PAIMA in 2018 and has significantly increased its network of international partners since becoming a member. "Joining PAIMA has been a big opportunity for us," said Alessandro. "Francesco and I always enjoy meeting people at the annual conference and we have gained a number of partners as a direct result of being a member. We also like the tonnage reports because it allows us to see who the top bookers are and compare our own activity with others around the world. Not all trade organizations do that."

During the next few years Bliss Moving & Logistics is looking to expand its traffic to new markets around the world, particularly in South America and Asia.



Just get it done

A story of undeterred vision and commitment to philanthropy

his is a story of a mover and philanthropist, Peter Naylor, whose compassion for the global community and commitment to students in Ghana changed their lives and showcased the values of the global moving and storage industry.

The Atorkor Vocational Training Institute (AVTI) is just miles away from the equator in a region of Ghana where power cuts are long and very common. But AVTI does not suffer from power cuts because most of its energy comes from solar power. AVTI offers adult programs in various subjects, including computer training, trade subjects and core subjects including languages and mathematics. It is also the only school under Chanian National Vocational Training Institute (NVTI) that is solar-powered and has become a model school when talking about green energy. This has been achieved due to the efforts of the late Peter Naylor, Ex-President of Tippet Richardson and various other individuals affiliated to the cause.

Success an uphill journey

While the journey to energy sufficiency has been extremely fruitful for AVTI, it was not an easy one and has only been made possible through the constant efforts of individuals like Peta Hall. In 2009 Peta went to Atorkor to assist local artisans in entrepreneurial skills training, she was shocked to see the poverty and unemployment and, working with the Atorkor Development Foundation, decided to build a school. She raised \$.25 million from her Canadian community and benefactors.

The school faced various restrictions in terms of resources. The architect had initially designed the school to use solar energy as the main energy resource as regular energy in Ghana is costly and cannot be depended upon. Sometimes electricity blackouts last beyond 12 hours a day. Stanley Yeboah, the AVTI manager said that having solar power would be a 'dream come true'.

It was at this time that Peter Naylor was introduced to Peta through a mutual friend. After hearing about the difficulties being faced by the students of AVTI, Peter took on the responsibility of funding and managing the solar project to completion.

Success was close but remained far

The plans were put into action. It was decided that the panels and equipment would be assembled in Toronto and then, using Tippet Richardson's resources, would be transported to Ghana. Just when the initial assembling was about to be completed, delays happened in sourcing specialized solar equipment customized to the weather and heat of Ghana. This postponed the implementation plan by months, but when the parts came, and the assembling was completed in Ontario, Peter used Tippet Richardson to transport the equipment quickly.

It was midnight when students and teachers of AVTI woke up on hearing the news of solar equipment reaching their facility. A combined effort led by David Carter (Energy Analyst from RESco Energy) started. Staff and students worked together day and night to finish the

installation. The project was near completion, but nature had other plans.

A very strong storm hit the town. Lightning exploded an external Ghanian hydro transformer and blew out the initial safety equipment and some other parts of the system. The students, staff, villagers and the whole community and volunteers were devastated by the incident. David returned to Canada and the process halted.

'Just get it done'- turning vision to reality

A couple of months later, David and new equipment arrived back in Ghana. They reassembled the solar equipment, and the project was completed. It was during this period that Peter passed away. He has now been named "Father" of the school. Peter's last words to Peta were "Just get it done" and everyone continued to believe in his vision and finally, did get it done. Now the same school is a prominent success story and has helped hundreds of students achieve their dreams.

AVTI becomes a well-developed school

The school started with 11 students and now has more than 300+ students enrolled. The status of the school has changed, and it has been elevated from a Class D to Class B school. There are now 15 professional instructors, approximately 10 National Service personnel and eight administrators.

Around 200 students have so far received their full NVTI graduation certificates, enabling them to continue their education to university and college or start working.

School has produced many success stories

Many success stories are being made at AVTI every year. A student said: "I was able to do study at night as there were no lights-out, so I was able to get my certificate." Students at AVTI have been making the most of this opportunity built by Peter and others.

One such story is of Jefferson, who was in the construction team when the AVTI was being built, after which he enrolled at AVTI on a textile design course. Post-graduation he applied to Ho Polytechnic and got selected. He graduated with a First-Class degree. He is now teaching at AVTI in the textile design department and has become an inspiration for many students.

The long-lasting impact of the project

The solar panels generate 30-35 Kilowatts of energy every day, out of which 15 kW is used by the school, 3 kW is used to power the clinic, 10 kW is kept in reserve and 5 kW is spare. The money saved by solar power is now directed towards building more infrastructure. Solar energy has become a vital part of the school's existence and ecosystem. The entire school obtains energy for the lights and fans from the solar panels, including security, the night lighting of the campus and homework study rooms.

Solar power has had a positive impact on multiple departments of AVTI, for example, it allowed AVTI to invest in 12 industrial sewing machines to make school uniforms, and irons for the 70 dressmaking students. The Catering Department uses solar energy to power its fridges, freezers, kettles, and other equipment. The Computer Department uses solar power for all the computers and fans.



The Construction Department, Electrical Department and Textile Design use lights and fans, and the solar energy also powers an air-conditioner.

Moving the world for better

live in a country far north, stretching way above the Arctic Circle, with long driving distances, rugged mountains and a very cold climate. Norway is not the most likely place to start a transportation revolution, but electric vehicles (EVs) are suddenly the new normal here. I would claim that if Norway can do it, any country can.

The shift won't happen overnight, but the speed of the transition here has surprised everyone. Almost 65% of new passenger cars sold in Norway in 2021 were electric; in addition, 22% were plug-in hybrids. Put differently, only 14% of new cars were sold without a plug. Now that there are many models to choose from and the range has improved, EVs are purchased all over the country. It took us only 10 years to move from 1% to 65%, and next year we're likely to

pass 80%. The US, China and other high polluting countries could use 2022 to enact policies that incentivize a similar shift.

So, how did Norway become the world's topselling electric-vehicle market per capita? Not because of suitable conditions, and definitely not because Norwegians are more environmentally friendly or concerned about climate change. We can instead credit strong demand-side, long-term policies. After all, it takes time to electrify all the cars on the road. Most cars are purchased second-hand, and people in the second-hand market are dependent on the choices made by new-car buyers. The government therefore taxes the sales of new polluting cars heavily but does not tax EVs at all, making EVs, which are more expensive because of their production costs. a competitive and appealing option. The Norwegian parliament has also decided that

all sales of new cars and vans shall be zero emission by 2025. The faster we get to 100% EV new sales, the faster we get there with all cars on the road.

Norway's progress has, of course, been helped by important emission restrictions directed at car manufacturers internationally, and we have seen the start of a global rollout of charging infrastructure. Did you see the final Super Bowl ad from GM? Will Ferrell told us he hated Norway because of the high uptake of EVs and that GM and the US were going to catch up. And the US has started! President Biden's infrastructure bill includes \$7.5 billion for a nationwide charging network.

But the US can go further in 2022, as can other countries, and implement policies directed at the demand-side. This can be done in different ways; the key is to start taxing new sales of at least the most polluting car models and use this money to subsidize EVs. This is a fair way to implement climate policies as it is aimed at people buying a new car, rather than an indiscriminate tax at the gas pump.

Consumers are given an option when buying a new car; they could, for instance, choose a model with lower emissions like a plug-in hybrid, which is not taxed, or even an EV that is subsidized. (To be clear, tax policies on purchase alone won't get where we need to be fast enough - in Norway, there are also several incentives in place such as lower road tolls, partial access to bus lanes and cheaper public parking for those who drive EVs - but it is the most important and effective step that countries around the world can take.)

What has my company done? First, we've had a small 100% electric service vehicle on the road since 2015. Used for physical PMS and at times also crew positioning (instead of sending out a truck with crew when only the manpower was needed). We are now in the final stage of placing an order for a brand new 100% electric service van. We've also



decided that all diesel removal trucks will be phased out and replaced with 100% electric trucks. Our order of 1-2 fully electric removal trucks will be placed within the next few months.

Further, we've installed plug-in chargers at the office for four electric vehicles to be charged simultaneously. These are constantly in use, free of charge for our employees.

Personally, Maria and I drive a 100% electric SUV with a 400 km radius. With the build-out charging stations along Norwegian highways, all that's needed is to enter your final destination on the car's GPS and the system suggests the route with on-route charging. Electricity provided by Norwegian renewable energy production sites. No stress - no pollution.
